In consideration for participating in the Dog Training Clinic at the Danton's Ranch in Yelm WA with Instructor David Danton of Danton Stock Dogs, the undersigned agrees as follows for the dates of September 26th & 27th, 2020:

I will keep my dog under my direct control at all times. This means that I will keep my dog restrained on a leash or in a kennel unless we are actively engaged in one-on-one training exercises or working livestock under the direction of the trainer/clinician.

I understand that participating in Dog Training Lessons and /or Clinics is inherently dangerous due to the unpredictable nature of both dogs. This activity exposes my dog and I to above normal risks of personal injury, and my property to above normal risks of damage.

I am participating in this Clinic at my own risk.

I am solely responsible for my own safety and that of my dog. I release Danton Stock Dogs, David Danton and Julie Danton, the owners of the property on which the Clinic takes place, and their agents, managers, employees and volunteers from any and all liability if I or my dog suffer personal injury and/or my property suffers physical damage.

I will take no legal action against any of the above persons or establishments upon injury to myself or my dog or damage to my property.

I am solely responsible for any personal injury and/or property damage incurred by others and caused by me or my dog.

I will promptly reimburse any party that sustains personal injury and/or property damage caused by me or my dog. In addition, I will indemnify and hold harmless Danton Stock Dogs, David Danton and/or the owner(s) of the property on which the Clinic and/or Trials take place, from any cause of action brought by others against them caused by the actions of me or my dog.

# What to bring for the Cow Dog Clinic

We are excited to have you join us for a fun day working and training with your dog. Here are a few helpful tips to prepare for the clinic. The area that we will be training in will be outside. Depending on the weather, it can be cold so please dress appropriately. Please wear shoes/boots that allow you to move quickly. The following is a list of tools that are used throughout the clinic in different exercises or to keep your dog secure. If you could bring these items with you, you will find it very beneficial to not have to share.

1. Collar - Your dog must have a collar on that can be tightened enough that it can't slip over your dog's head. PLEASE OT HARNESES!
2. Short Leash – approximately 6' is the preferred length.
3. Kennel – Kennel training will be part of the clinic if needed.
4. Sorting stick/ flag. A 6' sorting stick is highly preferred but sometimes hard to find.
5. 4' chain with clips on both ends. One end should have a swivel clip on it. This is to hook your dog to a panel or fence while not being worked. It must be a chain so it can't be chewed through.
6. Rubber feed tub for "barrel exercise" – not required but highly suggested. Google Danton Stock Dogs and then Barrel Exercise Introduction for the introductory video of the barrel exercise. Step one at the clinic will be to work your dog on the barrel. Your barrel should have a wide base so it is sturdy and not shaky, a wide enough top so your dog fits comfortably on top, and made of solid material. Rubber is preferred over plastic because your dog's claws feel more comfortable on it.
7. Electric control collar –not required or suggested. We will be discussing the proper training and usage of electric control collars as beneficial tools, not punishments. We hold the right to not allow them to be used until it is shown that you know how to use them properly, and your dog can perform the requested task without the use of the collar. We also hold the right to ban your use of the collar from the clinic if improperly used.
8. Patience – Always good when working in a group and with animals. Sometimes hard to find...
9. A positive, encouraging, can-do attitude – this is the most powerful tool you have available, it can be carried anywhere, and is a REQUIREMENT for success with your dog and the clinic.
